



Often asked – Who killed Jesus? Jews? Romans? While the Jewish religious leaders had him arrested and condemned due to their jealousy and feigned allegiance to the Law of Moses:

Jesus surrendered to the temple guards and was condemned because of God's jealous love for sinners and his commitment to redeem them and his allegiance to his law of love.

While Pilate the Roman governor, in spite of saying he was not guilty, sentenced him to die on the cross due to trumped up charges of treason against Rome:

Triune God of the universe allowed him to go to the cross for the true charges against mankind for treason against Him.

Jesus was not held on the cross by the strength of iron.

God's love for sinners was much stronger.

Jesus was not held on the cross by the 7-9" spikes pounded into hands and feet by Romans Soldiers.

God's mercy and grace was more powerful Jesus was not kept on the cross by the soldiers, armed with swords and spears, who were watching and guarding him.

God's angels were watching and just one angel was more than a match for the entire Roman army. The Plan of salvation required it.



Sin For Us

2 Corinthians 5:21 (MOFF) 21 In our behalf, He made him to be sin who himself knew nothing of sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God.



Luther called this verse the Great Exchange.

I have referred to it as the Greatest Transaction – from our perspective Ellen White – he was treated as we deserve that we might be treated as He deserved.

Moffatt's trnaslation – closest to original.

Made sin not became sin

Do not become righteous, focus on actions Become Righteousness, focus on being Isaiah 53:3 He is despised and rejected by men, A Man of sorrows and acquainted with grief. And we hid, as it were, our faces from Him; He was despised, and we did not esteem Him. 4 Surely He has borne our griefs And carried our sorrows; Yet we esteemed Him stricken, smitten by God, and afflicted. 5 But He was wounded for our transgressions, He was bruised for our iniquities; The chastisement for our peace was upon Him, and by His stripes we are healed.

NKJV - more familiar

Greek words have richer meaning than any English version/translation conveys

God's Word Translation

3 He was despised and rejected by people. He was a man of sorrows, familiar with suffering. He was despised like one from whom people turn their faces, and we didn't consider him to be worth anything.

3 He was despised -- discounted and scorned rejected by people – wanted no part of him. He was a man of sorrows – physical and mental familiar – knowledge gained by the senses with suffering – wounds from battle injuries.

God's Word Translation

3 He was despised and rejected by people. He was a man of sorrows, familiar with suffering. He was despised like one from whom people turn their faces, and we didn't consider him to be worth anything.

He was despised – discounted and rejected like one from whom people turn their faces – a broken relationship,

Esteemed him not – didn't give a second thought

4 He certainly has taken upon himself our suffering and carried our sorrows, but we thought that God had wounded him, beat him, and punished him.

He certainly has taken upon himself – bearing of guilt and sin for another.

Suffering – wounds from battle injuries

Carried - load given a servant as punishment

Sorrows - pain from a broken heart

4 He certainly has taken upon himself our suffering and carried our sorrows, but we thought that God had wounded him, <u>beat him</u>, and <u>punished</u> him.

God had wounded (stricken) – describes guilty receiving punishment they deserve beat him (smitten) – God as subject, judgment on sin

Punished (afflicted) - looked down on him

5 He was wounded for our rebellious acts. He was crushed for our sins. He was punished so that we could have peace, and we received healing from his wounds.

He was wounded – a piercing, fatal wound transgression – breach of a relationship crushed (bruised) – Genesis 3:15 sins — the totality of our bent, twisted, and distorted behaviors

Punished (chastisement) – the discipline that includes both punishment and instruction

5 He was wounded for our rebellious acts. He was crushed for our sins. He was punished so that we could have peace, and we received healing from his wounds.

Peace – shalom, being restored to the one who is wronged so that there is a complete and fulfilling restoration.


Wounds (stripes) – root word idea of joined together

Healed – God is the cause or source and there is a sense of complete healing and restoration.

He was wounded for our rebellious acts. He was crushed for our sins. He was punished so that we could have peace, and with his stripes we are healed.


